The Sovereign: Episode 2 Discussion Guide



Read Together

We're in a series called *The Sovereign: An 8-Episode Series on God, Esther, and the Rest of Us*. It's the story of young Jew, exiled from her homeland, wrestling with her identity as she rises from orphan nobody to Persian royalty—just in time to save her people from genocide.

- Can anyone recap Episode 1: "The Refusal" (Esther 1:1-22)?
- Each week, we'll ask someone to recap the story so far (or at least the last episode).

This week, we're in Episode 2: "The Contest" (Esther 2:1-18). Three years have passed since the end of Episode 1. *Let's read it together.*

Discuss Together

It's okay if you don't get through all the questions. As discussion leader, your job is to follow the lead of the Holy Spirit and facilitate a conversation that leads people toward everyday life like Jesus. Feel free to add additional questions of your own. If you have a big group, it can be helpful to discuss some questions in groups of 2-3 before opening it up to the whole group.

Additional Note: This week centers on sex. Some groups might find it helpful to split into men and women for this week, but that's up to the discussion leader.

- Can someone paraphrase this week's episode in your own words? If you miss a few details or leave anything out, the rest of the group can jump in at the end.
- What is something that struck you from an initial reading of the text?
- Esther has two names (2:7): Esther (her Persian/Babylonian name) and Haddasah (her Jewish name). It's a reminder that she lives in-between two worlds: her ethnic/religious identity as a fourth generation Jewish immigrant and the pagan, Persian world she grew up in.
 - Does anyone remember how the Jews ended up in exile in the first place?
 - Mordecai said that Esther could easily hide her Jewish identity (2:10). What are some reasons it might have been easier to just "blend in" with Persian society?

- What are some reasons that Christians might find it easier to just blend in our own cultural moment?
- On Sunday, we talked about the similarities between Xerxes approach to finding a spouse (2:8-16) and navigating love, sex, and relationships in our own cultural moment.
 - What are some similarities you see?
 - Xerxes approach was innately *competitive*. What are some ways that the modern approach to sex, relationships, and dating can feel like a competition?
 - Xerxes approach was very *superficial* and based on physical beauty alone. **What are some reasons we place so much emphasis on that? What's the problem with that?**
 - In the end, the final part of the audition to be Xerxes' wife was a night in his bedroom.
 Why do you think sex has taken such a prominent place in modern relationships? How might you respond to the idea that sex is just one step in getting to know someone as you're dating?
 - Esther, like every other woman in the competition, was *objectified* by Xerxes. What does it mean to objectify someone? Have you ever felt objectified? What's the problem with seeing someone as an object?
- Esther had sexual baggage. She had been in some questionable situations. And, lots of people have sexual and relational baggage as well. What are some ways that our sexual baggage can negatively affect us—especially in the church?
- Esther had sexual baggage, but God still used her. What you've done (or what's been done to you) does not limit what God can do through you. What would you say to someone who feels like their sexual baggage means that God can't use them?
- What other questions or thoughts do you have from this week's episode?

Pray Together

As you spend some time in prayer together, it might be a good opportunity for people to open up and ask for forgiveness (for things they've done) or healing (for things done to them).
